A Word from Our Pastor

Malcolm Guite's, "A Sonnet for Easter Dawn" includes the following lines:

She turns, but cannot focus through her tears,

Or recognize the Gardener standing there.

She hardly hears his gentle question 'Why,

That brightens as she chokes out her reply

'They took my love away, my day is night'

And then she hears her name, she hears Love say

The Word that turns her night, and ours, to Day.

Happy Easter, dear friends. The sweet, good news of Christ's resurrection comes to us once more as we celebrate what only God could do. Jesus is resurrected. Our night has turned to day. Even our losses have been turned to victories. I look forward to worshiping with you on Easter Sunday, April 9! 8am or 11am in the Sanctuary including FUMC Handbells and guest instrumentalists. The 9am service in the Worship Center will include Easter classics and fellowship with members and guests. See you on Easter Sunday! Bring a friend!

With respect to the administrative work of the church, I offer you a few updates. With the addition of Mary Hickox as Youth Director in January, the Staff Parish Relations Committee has been working to update the Staff Organization Chart, Job Descriptions, and Personnel Policies. It has been a strong start to 2023 with church finances. Through February, total giving for the year is at \$293,908 vs. \$231,024 to this point in 2022. We have already paid \$218,753 toward the Next 100 Years Campaign & Debt, much of which was given in the final days of '22. Our cash balances remain strong including special accounts for Memorials, Youth, Witt House, etc. Thank you for your giving to FUMC in support of its ministries. Keep up the great work!

With respect to the Trustees and their work, there are a number of updates. First and foremost, we are so pleased the first floor office suite renovation has begun. Last Spring's Debt Reduction "Next 100 Years Campaign" included the primary goal of paying down our construction debt by 2026 and tackling a few other needed projects. This office suite is fairly simple in that it does not require major construction. The plans include installing and rearranging interior walls, new carpet, ceiling, lighting, doors, windows, minor electrical, and data access. These new offices will make staff more efficient and allow for easier collaboration. The quote for this project is \$200k and FUMC has the money on hand. The project is expected to take 2-3 months to complete. Other foci of the Trustees include purchasing and installing a defibrillator at the Witt House, developing safety standards for the church and its ministries, continuing to remedy water issues in the basement of the Sanctuary, and researching the best possible future of the old parsonage property at 320 W. Main. More information will be forthcoming.

As I write this newsletter column, my family is expecting our third child at any moment. The baby may have arrived by the time you read this! Please pray for an uneventful delivery and a smooth first few weeks for our now family of five. I plan on a greatly reduced work schedule for five or six weeks following the baby's birth. I will preach on Easter Sunday (April 9) and will continue to keep up with email and various projects through the staff. Otherwise, Rev. Chase will assume most pastoral responsibilities. I encourage you to contact him as needed.

Again, I wish you a Happy Easter as we celebrate this change of season. Signs of new life are all around us. Nature pours forth praise with green leaves and flowers aplenty. Our church shares signs of new life including facility renovations, new members, confirmation class, and ongoing ministries. The work of the Resurrection continues around us and within us. MINISTRY SPOTLIGHT Focus Birthday Parties

A really beautiful ministry happens every month that we'd bet not too many people even know about. A group of ladies from the church go to Focus, Inc., a center for people with developmental delays, to celebrate the month's birthdays with the people who go there. One buys the juice, another picks up cupcakes. They come in the building, waving to the people there on the way, stopping to give a hug or two. They put cupcakes and ice cream cups on plates, and then go out to sing happy birthday and hand a card to people who have birthdays that month. After that, the ladies dole out apple juice and give everyone a napkin. So simple. The women then sit with the people who attend, check up on past conversations, and give more hugs. They make a really big deal out of birthdays, and the people who get a card signed by the ladies sometimes get emotional.

"Many years ago now a group of ladies from FUMC started coming to Focus once a month to celebrate that month's birthdays," said Glenda McEuen, former Focus, Inc. director. "We affectionately started calling them the 'church ladies' and 'birthday ladies'. The participants quickly started looking forward to their visits, after all, they all love cake and ice cream. But even more so, they enjoyed the time with the ladies after the treats were served when the ladies stayed and visited with the participants. We all like to feel special and the ladies do that for our participants when they stay and visit. They have shown a love for our special population in their years of doing this."

It started in 2012 when Focus, Inc. was given a grant through the church's Dollar Per Week program. Ladies from the church saw what the organization was and wanted a way to connect with the people there. From that desire, the birthday party ministry was born. Every month since (with the exception of a time for Covid restrictions), all of the women who can meet in the facilities' kitchen to get things ready. They know the 40+ people there by name and know even the relatives of the people there, their hobbies, and the sport they participate in for Special Olympics. The women have gotten to know and love the people that attend Focus and plan to continue to serve them in this way.

"We have been for the past nine years at least coming to celebrate the birthdays," said Susie Cook, organizer. "We're mostly here just to visit with the participants who are here and we have made some wonderful friends in the past nine years. It's been very rewarding for us. When we walk in the people are excited to see us. It's a really, really good feeling. We enjoy doing it very much."

The ladies who do the birthday ministry each month include Gloria Bridges, Susie Cook, Rose Gramling, Guyla Jackson, Rena Jackson, Mary Justice, Karoline Risker, Lissa Tabor, Charlotte Thompson, and Janice Wilcox. Anyone is welcome to attend this special event.















VOLUNTEER SPOTLIGHT: Mary Justice

Mary's calm demeanor, kind ways, and the fact that she just sees and loves everybody might make her the perfect person to head up a ministry like the Witt House food pantry, a job she had done since the pantry started in 2011. Mary was a member of the Friends of Faith circle and that group proposed that the Witt House become a food pantry because, in her words, "It's important for people to get fed." Mary

and Guyla Jackson were handed the reigns when then-Associate Pastor Angie Gage, who helped start the Witt House, left to pastor a church. Now she works every Tuesday in the morning and then again from 3:30-6pm. She doesn't have to come on Fridays as Guyla is in charge that day, but she adds that she comes a lot, anyway, because she "can't stand not to know what's going on." She heads up about 15 volunteers each Tuesday late afternoon as the cars line the parking lot.

Mary is also active in helping with the acolytes for the 11:00 am service, a job Mary calls a joy. "I'm so proud when I see them walking down the aisle." Mary works with Linda Futrell in getting the acolytes trained, dressed, and ready to go. "I love to see Linda in teacher mode," she joked.

Mary is also active as a Sunday School teacher; she teaches the Homemakers class. In addition, she helps cook the

Wednesday night meal, is a member of the prayer ministry, and the Focus birthday party ministry.



Mary has been a member of FUMC since 2007 when she moved from Lancaster, California, to help her sister, Jane, who she ended up moving next door to. It was natural for her to come back; Mary was born in Paragould and both of her parents were raised in the town. "I always felt like this was home," she said. Before she retired, Mary was a teacher, mainly 5th grade, but also taught 3rd and 4th grades.

Her favorite thing about FUMC is the people. "They've been very kind to me," she said.

When To Plant

The Greene County Agri Extension Service recommends waiting until April 15th to plant; you still might have to cover your plants if we have a late frost.

What To Plant

Cucumbers, Sweet Potatoes, Squash, Melons, Okra, Peppers, Eggplant, Sweet Corn, Tomatoes, Beans, Broccoli, and your flowering bedding plants.

What To Do

Keep your hoe sharp! Don't allow weeds to get an early start in your garden, prepare your gardens by applying two inches plus of compost, have your soil tested by the Greene County Extension office.

First United Methodist Church of Paragould is pleased to announce grant recipients for the church's Dollar Per Week program. The church had \$7,378 to distribute, gathered from the single \$1 bills in the offering plate from the previous year. The program has given out \$92,227 since it began in 2011.

The funds were distributed as follows: \$500 to the Greene County Historical Society (for printing books, photos, quarterlies and newsletters). \$1,000 to Sound Expression Music (providing needed equipment and instrument replacements), \$500 to Arkansas Methodist Medical Center (to cover the costs of lab work at community health fairs), \$1,000 to Together We Foster (to purchase reunification baskets that includes family games/activities, devotional, a card of encouragement, and a small gift card), \$600 to Focus, Inc. (for a library for the participants at Focus), \$750 to Mid-South Health Systems (for transportation to and from services and money for medications for clients), \$750 to the Greene County Parent Center (for various programs that benefit its students), and \$2,278 to the Witt House Food Pantry.

Recipients were chosen by a grant committee who reviewed submissions received earlier in the year.


